3a Energize Thurston Campaign Development Update	 Energy Thurston Campaign Update: With a new name, Energize Thurston, staff is aiming to launch the campaign in early 2025 – June 2025. Julie Downing is their community energy fellow who will be working to support the initiative.
	 There are two preliminary campaign designs: 1. Income-qualified pathway (based on AMI. 2. Self-Funded pathway (above income qualification limits) Types of equipment and services to include: heat pumps, heat pump water heaters, electrical panel upgrades for heat pumps, and weatherization services
	 Outreach and marketing strategy: The TCMC website will be used as a primary hub for campaign information. Additional strategies will include targeted advertising to specific communities, attend meetings with community groups at community events, provide Spanish translations, and provide budget for interpretation services.
3b. Comprehensive Plan Engagement: Urban Areas	 Discussion questions: See Appendix A Comprehensive Plan Engagement: Urban Areas HB1181 requires climate change planning goals. The Resilience subelement will focus on hazards that affect the region including heat, smoke, flooding (Tumwater and Thurston County), Sea Level Rise (Olympia), and increased rainfalls in winter. Resiliency sub-element include equitably enhance resiliency to avoid or reduce the adverse impacts, protect and enhance natural areas, prioritize actions that benefit overburdened communities,

	 Housing element requirements ensure that climate and housing do not compete against each other. City of Olympia updates: The city is updating its comprehensive plan. City of Lacey updates: The city have their first survey out. They are doing a web-based comprehensive plan and will be live by end of the year. Additionally, vulnerability assessments and risk assessments will be public by early 2025 City of Tumwater updates: The City has put together an advisory team. The Climate Element draft will be available for review and public comment by end of December.

4. Upcoming Agendas	 Upcoming agendas: Upcoming agenda requests from CAW: Tom Crawford requested an agenda item to focus on a workforce discussion to meet the demand of implementation of initiatives. An outcome could include more specific steps to address needs/wants so there is workforce available. The CAW voted and resulted in a majority (6 votes), therefore this item will be included in the December CAW meeting. Tom Crawford made a suggestion to include other jurisdictions to increase participation. An outcome could include deeper participation by other public entities that are not currently participating. Lindsey responded that the TCMC group is a formal partnership and would therefore require internal conversations, if warranted.


